
I struggled to classify this example of Milligan in Print. It is not strictly a broadsheet but perhaps is a different form of broadsheet.

The London Underground began displaying poems on poster in London Underground trains in 1986. The posters have also been sent to libraries and schools throughout the UK. Spike Milligan has had two poems published as part

of this program.

Another image of this one appears to have come from a newspaper and the note at the bottom suggests it was one of the early posters which would make it circa 1986 when the series started.







Poems on the Underground is catching. The London scheme to get poems up in the Tube trains has been adopted in various forms by the city transport systems of Dublin, Melbourne, Newcastle upon Tyne, and now Stuttgart. The London scheme is also developing: a new slant is being financed by a £6,000 grant from the Calouste Guidbenkian Foundation to be used to include poems for and by young people to be postered on the Tube.
