

The book contains 13 previously unpublished poems by Milligan. Many of them remain unpublished in his other books. The foreword written by Spike illustrates graphically Spike's state of mind at the time.

The print run on this book was 150 numbered copies but some libraries have copies that are designated 'out of series' or simply are not numbered suggesting there were more than 150 copies produced. Two unnumbered books that I am aware of have at least four pages that are not included in the numbered books. This is a folded sheet of the original paper giving four extra pages. The first page is a title page, then a blank page, then further publication details and a block illustration and the last page includes the poem *Spring*. The fact that 50 were for sale at 26/- post paid was included with the publication details. This extra sheet appears to be an advertising pamphlet for the book on the same paper as the book and has been laid in to the original book. Copies in libraries are often signed by Toni Savage suggesting it was he who distributed the book quite extensively.

The distribution of this book is interesting. There are 25 libraries in WorldCat that carry copies. Six are in the U.K. and Ireland, the rest are in the U.S. (16) and Canada (3). Only the British Library has a numbered copy, number 5, the others, Cambridge, Oxford, National Library of Scotland, Devon Libraries and Trinity College, Dublin have unnumbered copies.

The origin of the books is not often recorded in library catalogues but it seems many have copies from Toni Savage; however some libraries have purchased their own copies.

An undergraduate poetry magazine, Sad Traffic, produced by students of Bretton Hall College in Barnsley Yorkshire, has a serialised version of 'Values' in issue 2 and 3 in 1970. Included were Spike's foreword and the first six poems. There are no more poems in subsequent issues. There is no explanation in the magazine of why not all the poems were not serialised. There is a statement that they intended to publish all at the outset but something prevented them from completing this intention. Spike was certainly keen to distribute his serious poetry widely.
